In turn, there are always tasks in which the unique skills and talents of each volunteer can be put to effective use, whether it is helping support patients, residents, and their family members directly or assisting with administrative work.

DIRECT CARE VOLUNTEER

Direct Care Volunteers are volunteers who commit to working directly with patients, residents, caregivers, and their families. Direct Care Volunteers provide support and comfort to patients and families in many ways. Common areas where direct care volunteers can provide assistance are:

- Provide bedside support to complement the role of the patient or residents family member (s) when the individuals family and/or friends are not available to be present due to personal obligations
- Provide bedside support to relieve the custom care team during peak service times
- Offer non-judgmental and active listening during a client's journey

INDIRECT CARE VOLUNTEER

Indirect Care Volunteers are volunteers who prefer not to work with patients directly, their time and effort can be put to use by assisting with administrative and general office tasks. Common tasks where indirect care volunteers provide assistance are:

- Assisting with clerical duties such as taking on the on-call designate (ONC) role on weekend and statutory holidays
- Assisting and participating in preparations and setup for special events and education sessions
- Assisting and participating in various fundraising events

Whether opting to be directly or indirectly involved with patient, resident and family hospice care, volunteers are able to use their unique talent and skill sets to support the clientele served with a more comfortable end-of-life experience.
